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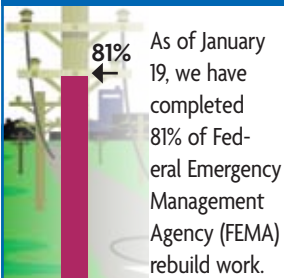

The Cooperative Difference

Now, as always, it's a good time to be a member of an electric cooperative. Not only are co-ops locally owned and controlled—by you, our members—they are locally run to serve your needs.

While many Kansas electricity consumers pay power bills to companies that answer to stockholders who demand a healthy profit every quarter, we focus on service to our members. Co-ops aren't under pressure to keep rates high enough to generate big profits. Instead, co-ops try to keep your bill as low as possible while providing high-quality service. Co-ops return money in excess of operating costs (known as margins) to you in the form of capital credits.

Unlike the boards of directors of investor-owned utilities who keep an eye on generating profits for people living far away, your co-op's trustees—fellow members, by the way—focus on keeping lights on safely, reliably and keeping costs affordable in our local community. That's why you elected them. That is what's so great about co-ops.

You may know the history of the electric cooperative movement, how seven decades ago rural residents banded together to bring the conveniences of electricity to their communities when investor-

owned utilities would not extend service. The associations they formed, on the same democratic principles as this great nation, are as strong and relevant today as they were back then.

The seven principles upon which electric co-ops were founded—voluntary and open membership, democratic member control and members' economic participation, among others—are as meaningful today as they were when electric co-ops began in the 1930s.

The leadership at Twin Valley Electric Cooperative shares the same concerns as you, our members. We are accessible; you can give us a call or send us an e-mail and know someone here is listening.

In these days of economic turmoil, folks who receive electricity from co-ops are lucky. As locally owned and operated businesses, electric co-ops understand the people they serve. Trustees and employees at your co-op have the same pride of place as you do, because it is our community, too. We act like neighbors because we are neighbors.

NOTES FROM OPERATIONS

A Minor Gain for Thieves Creates Major Costs for Cooperatives

In an effort to control costs, I would like to inform our members about the current epidemic that electric cooperatives and other utilities are facing. This problem

rears its ugly head every once in a while when the price of metals goes up along with the desperation of our criminal element. I'm talking about copper theft.

Twin Valley was hit where we are doing our FEMA work and the thieves targeted new poles that were prepared to be installed. We have taken great measure in using material that should help deter theft, but as we all know, the criminal element is resourceful and will find a way to defeat the mechanisms we have in place.

Instead of fighting the special staples we use to hold the copper ground wire in place, the thieves cut the wire on either side of the staples that are approximately 18-inches apart. On one pole, they acquired less than \$2 worth of copper, but it will cost your cooperative nearly \$75 to repair the damage and replace the copper. If you take this over multiple poles, the thieves' gain is minor and the cost to Twin Valley can be major.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, copper thefts run in excess of \$1 billion and, as we

all know, those costs are shared by every consumer. We are fortunate the thefts so far to Twin Valley are minor and no one has gotten hurt or killed as a result. As with anything such as this, the thefts will probably get worse before it gets better.

Several photographs floating around the World Wide Web show thieves that were not really as smart as they thought they were. They cut the wrong wire and went from healthy young men to crispy critters in the blink of an eye. I don't want to sound uncompassionate, but I have no room in my vocabulary for thieves. Once you take something that does not belong to you, you fall pretty far down the food chain. Many thieves don't know the totality of what they are doing and death to themselves, a public citizen or a cooperative lineman is a potential anytime thefts like this occur.

Twin Valley reports every copper theft or any other item that is stolen from your cooperative. We have a great relationship with the sheriff's office and will continue to report and prosecute any theft. If you witness or have information concerning these thefts, please contact the sheriff's office or call Twin Valley. If you have suspicions that someone you know may be involved in these thefts, please remind them, it is better to be judged by 12 than carried by six.
